PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Transportation

2016 - Maintenance

Pothole Patching – With the frost fully out of the ground potholes have been appearing throughout Town. Crews have been working to fill the potholes as they are reported.

Sweeping – The sweeper has been out on the streets collecting all the sand and debris that have built up on the roads over the winter.

Crack Sealing – Designated roads in town are having their cracks sealed with an asphalt emulsion. Crack sealing prevents water and debris from entering the pavement structure, increasing the life of the pavement.

Traffic Line Painting – Over the fall and winter traffic lines painted onto the street are worn away by vehicles and snow clearing operations. Every summer the lines are repainted to be fully visible to traffic and pedestrians.

Please be careful and drive slowly when passing our employees who are working on the roads.

Utility

2016 - Excavations

Currie Road N – Water and sewer mains will be extended along Currie Road for the new houses that are under construction. Water mains vary in size from 100 mm to 250 mm diameter and sewer mains vary in size from 100 mm to 375 mm. Since waste water moves through the sewer mains by gravity, it is important to install them at the correct grade to keep the water moving.

New Services – With several new residential buildings under construction utility operators will be busy hooking up new services. This work involves excavating down to the water mains under the street and running a waterline and sewer line to the building. A valve is installed at the property line with a stem extending to ground surface. This valve is used to turn on and off the water to the house without requiring an excavation down to the valve.

Water Breaks – There has only been one water break so far this year. As soon as breaks are identified by the public or town staff, locates are called in to determine the location of other buried utilities. Once the utilities are

marked, a backhoe excavates down to the water main and utility operators repair the pipe.

Councillor's Corner

Spring seems to have finally arrived, and for those of us in the municipal world, that means that we are in the middle of our busiest time of year. Spring is when the yearly budgets and final plans for capital works projects are determined and much work is done to ensure that the many services provided by the municipality financed with the best value to the taxpayer in mind.

Just a few of this year's capital works expenditures include curb, gutter and pavement on 6th avenue west, upgrades to the west end storm sewer outflow, as well as completing the switchover to remote read water meters which will

allow the town to reduce the labour costs required for quarterly meter readings.

This year's budget also brings with it a more efficient way of delivering handi-transit services to our citizens with limited mobility. Due to normal turnover within the town's fleet of vehicles, the by-law enforcement officer/handi-transit driver will have his truck being sent to public works and being replaced with a smaller single wheelchair handi-transit van. This will allow us to dual purpose this vehicle and provide mobility services in a much more efficient manner when transporting only one or two clients. The town will still continue to offer service to larger groups with the larger handi-transit vehicle.

The 2016 budget will also see the same user pay system implemented on non-residential garbage users that was implemented on the residential garbage users last year. In real terms this change will mean that every dumpster picked up will cost the same amount per pick and all users of the service will now be paying the same rate for the same level of service. These changes have effectively converted the garbage services offered by the Town into a utility paid on a per service level rate similar to the water and sewer utility. Information regarding the garbage fees as well as other special service by-laws were delivered to your mailboxes and should answer many of the questions you may have. The public hearings regarding these by-laws were held on May 2nd.

Speaking of the water and sewer utility, the Town of Swan River has unfortunately had to apply to the Public Utilities board for its first rate increase in fourteen years. The Town works hard to keep a lid on costs increases, but after fourteen years of working hard to ensure rates did not rise, costs in the utility have reached a point where the Town has had to ask the public utilities board for a small increase this year. This increase is due to many infrastructure investments the Town has done to the water/sewer system. These investments include complete rebuilds of

the Ross and Heyes street lift stations, shovel ready engineering on the 7th Ave lift station, pump upgrades to the Dixie lift station as well as engineering work done for future upgrades to the lagoon to ensure compliance with environmental regulations. Should the Public Utilities Board approve the requested rate increase, the Town of Swan River will still have some of the lowest water/sewer rates in the province.

In other news, I had the opportunity to join Councillor Jacobson, Mayor McKenzie, as well as Councillor Minish from Swan Valley West, Erin Brown from the Chamber of Commerce and Heather Nielsen from SV RISE, as a delegation at Hudson Bay Route Association AGM in Yorkton SK. The Hudson Bay Route Association is a 71 year old education/promotion/lobbying organization that works to promote the use of the Port of Churchill. Our delegation was able to lobby the Association to hold their two day AGM in Swan River in 2017. This will see 100+ attendees and their spouses coming to see everything the Swan Valley has to offer. ***Councillor Jason Delaurier***

Recreation

Please welcome Patti Henkelman in her new position as General Manager of Recreation overseeing the Recreation Department for the Town of Swan River. Patti had previously been the Recreation Director at the Swan Valley District Recreation Commission (SVRDC) and also the Interim Manager of Aquatic Services for the Town. This change has come about due to restructuring of recreation within the Town as well as the SVRDC. Patti will be responsible for operating budgets, capital budgets, policy development, strategic planning, managing staff of approximately 25 - 30, facility lifecycle planning, grant and proposal writing, liaison with other community groups, developing partnerships and liaison with Sport Manitoba and the Manitoba Recreation & Regional Services department.

The Swan River Parks & Recreation Commission no longer exists as all facility management in the Town will now fall under the new Recreation

Department. The Department has also had some other staffing changes. John Rooks, formerly the Facility Manager is gearing up for his retirement later this year and will remain with us on a part time basis until then. Hugh Hunt is the new Recreation Operations Coordinator – Arena & Parks while Brendan Fedorchuk is the new Recreation Operations Coordinator – Aquatic Centre. Hugh and Brendan will be the main contacts at their respective facilities and will work together to ensure efficient operations. The Recreation Director, Aquatic Services Manager, Facility Manager and Assistant Facility Manager positions were all eliminated under the new structure. This will help the Town streamline their operations and budget. A Programmer will be hired later this year to help with programming at all the facilities and continue to maintain and expand the SVDRC programs.

The SVDRC will still exist as an advisory board to look at recreation from a Valley wide perspective. It will continue to be funded by the Town of Swan River, Municipality of Swan Valley West and Municipality of Minitonas-Bowsman. The board consists of 13 members from the 3 participating municipalities and the school division. The board will meet 4 times a year to discuss recreation issues common to all the communities and strategize ways we can improve and build on what currently exists. The SVDRC will look at ways to maximize available funding, keep facilities viable, ensure municipal dollars are spent effectively and bring community groups together for long term planning.
