

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

<u>Transportation</u> 2015 – Capital Projects

- 1. **3**rd **St. South Basework** In preparation for paving in 2016, 3rd Ave South between 11th Ave and 13th Ave was excavated to remove saturated soils and replace them with pitrun and gravel. The basework was surveyed and graded to be ready for asphalt paving.
- 2. **1**st **St. North Sidewalk** Completed in August this sidewalk will increase pedestrian accessibility along 1st St North. An extension of the sidewalk to PTH 10 N is planned for 2016.

2015 - Maintenance

Tree Trimming – Trees overhanging back lanes throughout town have been trimmed back to increase driver visibility and to improve garbage removal operations.

Snow Clearing – While the mild start to winter has meant less accumulation of snow then in recent years, crews have still been busy plowing streets and clearing residential sidewalks after the early winter snowfalls.

<u>Utility</u> 2015 - Capital Projects

1. Heyes Street Lift Station Upgrade – All mechanical and electrical components have been installed including replacement of all the internal piping and upgraded pumps to handle surge flows. Programming and component testing is scheduled to be completed in early January prior to project completion and commissioning of the lift station.

2. Radio Water Meter Replacement – Water meters were being upgraded to radio read units throughout December. The new meters are read remotely which saves the utility operators a considerable amount of time collecting readings thereby freeing them up to work on other projects.

2015 - Excavations

Water Breaks – There have been several leaks of the transmission and distribution system this year. Fixing the leaks requires a backhoe to excavate down to the pipe. Once the pipe is exposed the utility operators repair the leak and then soil is backfilled into the excavation and covered with recycled asphalt. During the repair water may have to temporarily be turned off to buildings located on the same street.

New Services - When a new water or sewer service is requested for a new building an excavation is dug down to the depth of the water and sewer stub out left by the plumber. The utility operators attach a coupler to the stub out and then run service lines out to the water and sewer mains located under the street. A valve called a "curb stop" is connected to the water service line at the approximate location of the property line. A rod is connected to this valve and brought to surface so that the water can be turned on and off without requiring an excavation down to the valve.

Councillor's Corner

Now that the Primary Health Care Clinic is up and running I thought it would be appropriate to give a brief history of its evolution and a big "Thank You" to the many people who made it all happen.

Yes it still has a way to go but our 5 new doctors are taking further education to obtain their and our goals of returning obstetrics plus other services to our valley. Two more doctors and a medical student have signed contracts to return to practise medicine in the Swan River Valley. We expect Dr. Tyler Burnside will arrive early in July, 2016 to open his practise. Our community has been active for 40 plus years in the process of doctor recruiting.

Recently, with the formation of the Medical Services Committee, with the

support of all the G-7 Municipalities and RISE, recruiting picked up speed.

Town of Swan River Councillors, R.M. Councillors, local doctors, RISE, Prairie Mountain Health, plus many volunteers got together to make an action plan.

Meetings, seminars and doctor recruiting interest groups where attended in Swan River, Minitonas, Winnipegosis, Dauphin, Brandon, Steinbach and Winnipeg.

The Rural Interest Groups (RIG) seminars proved a valuable source of new doctors. Under the leadership of Rise previous director Shawna Klekta hosted 46 medical students in Swan River. Local citizens took medical students on tours and fishing when they came here as part of their rural placements.

Lorne Henkelman took a lead role in encouraging the G-7 to set aside money for recruiting/retaining medical professionals. Maryann Friesen volunteered to act as retaining chair, an integral part of the process.

Our Valley Lions Clubs remain active in fund raising for specialized technologies our new doctors will need.

The Hospital Foundation purchased a condo for temporary accommodations for prospective and newly signed doctors.

Penny Gilson CEO of Prairie Mountain Health worked with our committee and provided much in negotiations with the doctors.

It quickly became apparent that a Primary Health Care clinic where the new doctors could work in a collaborative workplace would be a key component in the recruiting process.

Our MLA Ron Kostyshyn and Premier Selinger helped in accessing funds needed for its purchase and reconstruction.

This increase in our health care services has also had a huge economic impact on our Valley. We were often told at seminars that an average physician will bring approximately \$800,000.00 per year into their respective communities. Gas, clothing, hotels and food to name a few will all be purchased by visitors coming for medical help. So with 5 new doctors and 3 more coming that could be as much as 6.4 million dollars a year.

Shauna Klekta and RISE can be proud of their successes.

Our present objective is to create an expanded "Retaining Team" to try to encourage our new doctors to stay for an extended time. If you are interested, we need your help, feel free to contact myself or Maryann Friesen.

In conclusion, a Valley Success, thank ALL of you who made a dream become reality.
